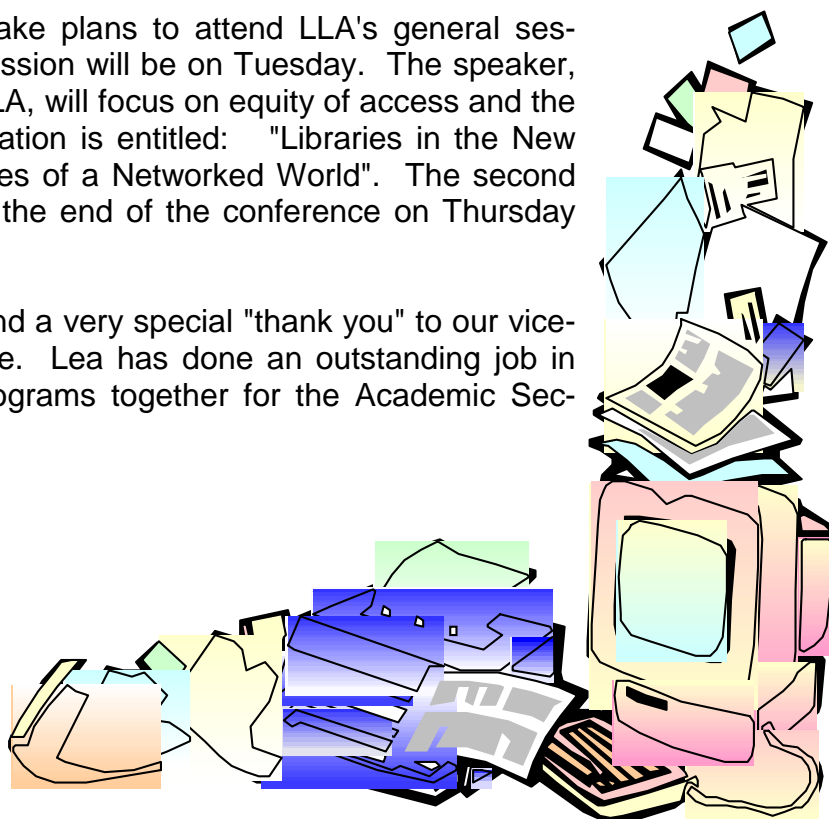

Special Collections has received a grant from the Louisiana Division of the Arts to continue processing of the Louisiana Folklife Programs project files. TULANE UNIVERSITY Libraries

Bruce Boyd Raeburn, curator of the Hogan Jazz Archives has recently published "Early New Orleans Jazz in Theaters," *Louisiana History*, vol. XLIII, no. 1 (Winter 2002). He also gave an audio-visual presentation, "Jewish Jazz Musicians," at the New Orleans Jazz National Historical Park Visitors Center, New Orleans, January 18, 2002.

Jack Lynn Calbert, bibliographer and reference librarian, retired January 31, 2002. Dr. Calbert came to the Howard-Tilton in 1991, and, during more than a decade of his employment, assisted with the library's collection development policies, its approval plans, its electronic resources, and its gifts program. UNIVERSITY OF LOUISIANA AT LAFAYETTE Dupré Library

Dupré Library has been honored by the F.W. Dodge Louisiana Contractors Association with a Best Public Architecture Award for 2001. Sharing in the honor were Architects Southwest of Lafayette. This prestigious award was presented to **Charles W. Triche, III**, director, and Steve Oubre, the principal architect, at a ceremony in January in Baton Rouge. The award is based on several factors — function, appearance, and use requirements.

Traditional and exotic wooden carvings by father and son Cyril and Ivy Billiot along with palmetto baskets and Spanish moss dolls crafted by Marie Dean, are being showcased through March. The "Houma Indian Arts: Triptych" exhibit is on display in the Jefferson Caffery Louisiana Room in Dupré Library.
